

High School Movies: The Writing Assignment

Due Date:

Option 1:

Compare and contrast your high school life to the high school life of **one of the characters** from *Ferris Bueller's Day Off*.

Pick at least three categories (social life, friends, parental relationships, personality, **etc.**) and compare the similarities and differences.

Your paper should follow the **point-by-point compare/contrast format**. It needs all the regular elements of an excellent essay: an attention grabber, a solid thesis, well-developed body paragraphs, and a clinching conclusion.

Be sure to be specific in your body paragraphs when doing your comparisons. Include precise details from the film and then the related facts from your own life.

Option 2:

What makes *Ferris Bueller's Day Off* a successful high school movie?

Pick at least three essential characteristics from the film. Discuss how these elements are important and make the movie great. Use specific examples from the movie to prove your thesis.

Your paper should be a minimum of 5 paragraphs long. It should contain the regular elements of an excellent essay: an attention grabber, a solid thesis, well-developed body paragraphs, a clinching conclusion.

Option 3:

Pick **one** of these thesis statements and write an argumentative essay that agrees or disagrees with the premise.

- Ferris Bueller's Day Off is the ultimate expression of the American idea of freedom.
- As a privileged young white man from an affluent home "rebelling" against the "injustices" of a wealthy suburban school, Ferris Bueller is the picture of entitlement.
- Tom and Katie Bueller love their children, but they don't understand either of them. At all.
- Ferris's sole mission is to help Cameron become more confident in the face of his father's cruelty and materialism.
- Cameron isn't afraid of his dad; he's afraid of the homicidal fury he'll unleash if he goes off on his dad.
- Cameron achieves freedom when he chooses to disregard his self-created problems.

Build an intro paragraph that finishes with one of these thesis statements or a variation of one.

For your 3+ body paragraphs, pick examples from the film that support your thesis. Analyze and explain these examples and how they connect.

Your paper should be a minimum of 5 paragraphs long. It should contain the regular elements of an excellent essay: an attention grabber, a solid thesis, well-developed body paragraphs, a clinching conclusion.
